

Public Works Reminders:

Brush Collection Guidelines

- A maximum of three armfuls of brush and two bags per residence per month
- Brush must be under 6' in length and less than 6" in diameter
- Place brush lengthwise along the curb perpendicular to the street
- Do not interlock large piles of brush, place in a uniform manner along curb
- Leaf, grass clippings, small twigs and non-invasive weeds must be placed in paper bags for collection

Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOG)

When cooking fats, oil, or grease is allowed to go down the drain, it eventually cools in the wastewater (sewer) system and sticks to pipes creating FOG buildup. The buildup causes clogs and backups into homes and businesses, wastewater overflows and spills onto private property, streets, and into local waters. FOG buildup increases the cost of maintaining your wastewater treatment system and can create serious public health problems. Do not dump cooking fats, oil, or grease down your faucets or toilets.

How to dispose of fats, oils, and grease:

- Absorb fats, oil and grease by wiping with a paper towel and disposing in the trash.
- Mix coffee grounds with fats, oil, and grease and dispose in trash.
- Place cooled oil in an old soup can or jar, let it harden and dispose of the hardened substance in trash.
